Nellie seems quiet compared to her two rowdy older brothers who jostle constantly. One of their yearly competitions comes while driving to a beach vacation when each tries to be the first to spy the ocean. As usual, Nellie sits quietly between them until, under a thick veil of fog, she claims she sees it. Her brothers accuse her of cheating and only then does she softly begin, "The ocean is an old, old man born at the beginning of time." There follows one of the most poetic descriptions of the ocean you'll ever read-one that will stun you as much as it stuns Nellie's family. Silent for a long time, they acknowledge her truth and another . . . that she can't see.
